





HEALTH

Mental illness is the number one cause of disability and the second leading cause of premature death in America. This past year, the *Christian Family Counseling Center* conducted 8,165 counseling sessions, helping 1,222 clients. Results of those sessions reported marriages **SAVED** people at significant risk of suicide choosing **LIFE**, and many others received the help they needed to recover from the effects of divorce, the global pandemic, and other situations. **Hearts that Care Clinic** provided over 1,233 life-saving prescriptions for patients.

The Parkinson's Foundation of Oklahoma works to inspire hope and transform life for Parkinson's patients and families in Oklahoma. They do this through many programs, including the Parkinson's Support Network (served 415 last year), Voice Therapy Program (served 612), and PWR!

At last data collection, there are more than 6,500 Oklahoma children in state custody. *CASA of Southwest Oklahoma* works to specially select and train compassionate volunteer advocates to represent the best interests of abused and neglected children who are wards of the juvenile court. Children who are represented by CASA are more likely to achieve permanency, become adopted, and report significantly higher levels of **HOPE**, while also being less likely to reenter the child welfare system.



SUCCESS BY 6

Success By 6's mission is to ensure all Oklahoma children will enter school healthy and ready to succeed in school and in life. Our Family Empowerment Program brings parents, children, community leaders, educators, and health and human services professionals together to provide educational sessions at no cost to underserved families in our community. In addition, we are able to provide gift cards and meals to 40 families a month for basic household and life necessities.

SCOUTING LIFE SKILLS

Scouting teaches kids camping, hiking, survival skills, and a variety of outdoor education programs, teaching them how to be resourceful and maintain a healthy lifestyle.







The Boy Scouts Last Frontier Council prepares youth with the ability to make **ethical life choices** over their lifetime. Scouts engage in a variety of activities designed to address their physical, mental, and spiritual needs. The Boy Scouts Last Frontier Council served 689 participants in 2023.

The Girl Scout Program of Western Oklahoma provides girls with the tools to build confidence, life skills, leadership traits, and self-esteem. Girl Scouts practice **Collaborative learning** to promote sharing of knowledge, skills, and learning in an atmosphere of respect and cooperation as girls work together on goals that can be accomplished with the help of others. The Girls Scout Program of Western Oklahoma served 367 girls in southwest Oklahoma in 2023.

The Boys and Girls Club is a safe and positive environment where kids can have fun and learn how to become a **productive citizen** in their communities. They build supportive relationships with children through current learning opportunities and an appreciation for expectations. The Boys and Girls Club in Lawton, OK served 444 members in 2023.

Teen Court put 1270 students through peer court sentencing in 2023. Their delinquency prevention program serves as an alternative to formal charges being filed against a first-time offender, as well as **educating youth** on faulty thinking, substance abuse, and conflict resolution and anger management. Teen Court helps build self-esteem through public speaking, education on our judicial system, and giving back to the community through **Yolunteerism**.

Bridges Out of Poverty works to address generational poverty and leads the Comanche County Community Health Improvement Plans Poverty Work Group. They have efforts at all levels of city and county government to increase poverty alleviation. 100% of their program participants have decreased debt load and many have decreased in receiving assistance.

LEGAL SERVICES

Last year, Legal Aid of Southwest Oklahoma closed 704 civil cases that provided legal services to financially disadvantaged or vulnerable Oklahomans.

FINANCIAL STABILITY

Catholic Charities provides long term case-management to individuals and families to address needs including **financial management**, education, wellness, employment, affordable housing, and mental health needs. Through their Emergency Rent and Utility Assistance Program, Catholic Charities assists clients by paying a portion of their housing or utility payment to prevent eviction and utility disconnection, resulting in future **homelessness prevention** in the community. Catholic Charities was able to serve 1037 individuals and families in 2023.

Family Promise is a full-time shelter that provides homeless families with children a safe and stable environment in which to learn and achieve **Sustainable independence**. They equip families with the knowledge necessary to manage their money, sustain employment, set long-term goals for their families, and how to achieve their goals. Family Promise was able to serve 23 families in southwest Oklahoma in 2023.

Last year, *Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma* closed 704 civil cases and provided legal services to financially disadvantaged and vulnerable adults. They ensure fairness and secure justice for low-income Oklahomans by removing barriers to equal justice and disrupting the poverty cycle by removing barriers to **stable and productive lives**.

BASIC NEEDS


At least 10% of Senior Citizens in Comanche County live in poverty, often **forcing them to Choose** between purchasing food or medications. The *Lawton Food Bank's Emergency Food Assistance Program* provides food delivery for many of these homebound and disabled seniors who otherwise would go without food. They provided food to over 38,713 families through the Emergency Food Assistance Program.

Marie Detty Youth & Family Services; New Directions provides a safe haven for women, men, and children who are escaping the trauma of domestic violence, sexual assault and/or stalking. 2,282 survivors received shelter, case management, counseling, job placement assistance, protective order assistance and prevention services. Nearly 1 in 4 were victims of domestic violence. Domestic violence reports to police from 2006 until now have increased by 220.9% in Comanche County alone. Their Emergency Youth Shelter is the only adolescent shelter in Southwest Oklahoma and 96% of youth returned home or to a stable placement after crisis in 2023, and the shelter served 140 troubled youth in 2023.

All participants who entered the program at *Family Promise's Interfaith Hospitality Shelter* leave with proper identification.

In 2023, *The Center for Creative Living* served 7,006 healthy meals to senior citizens through their Senior Health, Wellness and Nutrition Program. 100 meals are delivered to homebound seniors 3 times a week, and a total of 38,261 meals were served this past year.

At the Salvation Army Shelter & Soup Kitchen, 34,537 shelter nights, meals and case management were provided to homeless individuals through the Shelter.
